

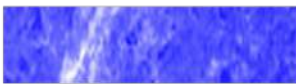

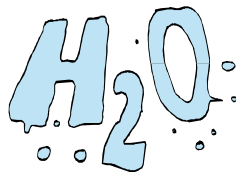

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### Sawyer Straw – Tried & Tested

We have all seen the portable water filtration systems that takes in sediment filled & fecal contaminated water and produces ready to drink water at the end.

So, Joe went out to give the Sawyer Straw a try. Stone Dam water was selected as the test subject.

A Raw sample was collected. A second sample of the same raw water that had been run through the Sawyer Straw process.

Off to the lab it went. Raw sample was heavily discolored, while the filtered sample was greatly improved.

When the results came in; Raw water tested positive for contamination (fecal)

Sawyer Straw was Absent for contamination (all)

So, in conclusion the Sawyer Straw did preform as advertised. It took raw, dirty, contaminated water and after filtration, removed the contamination from the water.

A couple notes. The Sawyer Straw was new out of the package. Testing was pre-arranged with our la-

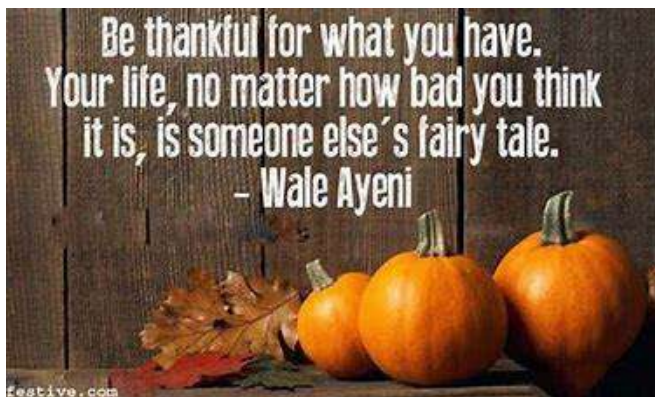
boratory. They were also interested in the results.

**GUIDELINES & POLICIES FOR PLANNED EVENTS AT STONE DAM LAKE**

First, call the Ash Fork Water Service (928)637-2774 with your plan and get approval of the date for the event. Event planners will also have to have a “Certificate of Insurance” with Ash Fork Development Association, Inc. as additional insured. If AZ Game & Fish are partnering in this event, contact should be made.

AFDA Board Members are pleased to learn of planned events scheduled and hope to see more.

We are asking for your help. As things grow, so do responsibilities. Your support is appreciated when Committee Members put together needed fundraisers to meet the yearly expenses (more than \$3,000 per year, which includes a yearly dam inspection, taxes, insurance, port-a-potty rental, fish stocking, trash pick up) and future recreational growth at Stone Dam. ## APS: How to Prepare for Winter Weather Outages



Winter is near, which could mean harsh cold weather and the potential for unexpected power outages in Ash Fork. While APS crews are prepared and ready to respond to power outages, every interruption of service is different. Weather conditions, accessibility to damaged equipment and other factors may contribute to the length of the outage. APS reminds Ash Fork and surrounding area residents to prepare ahead to stay safe during and after an outage.

### Before an outage:

- Check the batteries in flashlights and medical devices regularly, especially when a storm is forecasted.
- Sign up to receive text and email alerts when there is an outage in your neighborhood by going to [aps.com/outages](http://aps.com/outages) and ensure that your APS contact phone numbers are updated.
- If you have life-support medical equipment, please register for the Medical Preparedness Program by calling APS at 602-371-7171. This ensures that APS is aware of your emergency medical needs in the event of an outage.
- If you have an automatic garage door, be sure to know how to open the door manually in case you are without power.
- Keep handy a warm coat, gloves or mittens, hat, water-resistant boots, extra blankets and warm clothing for each member of the household.

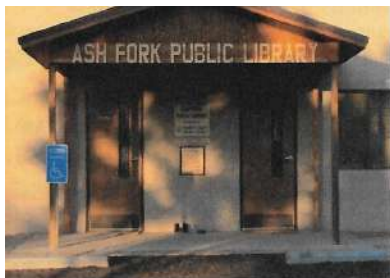

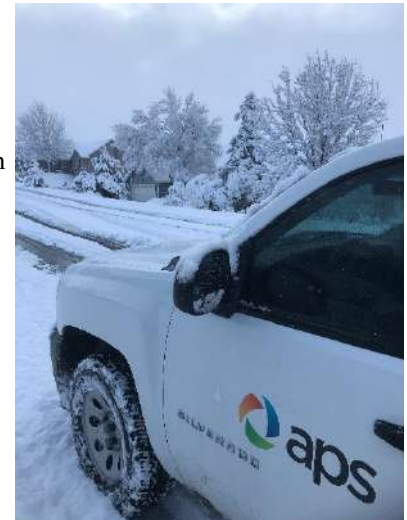

**During an outage:**

- Access real-time outage updates and estimated restoration times by calling 602-371-3680, visiting the APS mobile app or [aps.com/outagemap](http://aps.com/outagemap).
- Turn off and unplug all unnecessary electrical equipment and appliances to protect them from electrical spikes when service is restored. Wait 5-10 minutes after power comes back on to plug in and turn on major appliances and electrical equipment.
- If your home is the only one without power in your neighborhood, the outage could be caused by your home's circuit breaker.
- Don't try to repair electric problems on your own. Electricity can be deadly.
- During prolonged outages, Yavapai County and Red Cross will coordinate to establish warming stations. Information on the centers will be available via the APS out and on the Yavapai County Emergency management Facebook page.
- If you see a power line down stay 100 feet away and call 911 and APS.

## Kaibab Estates West Water Utility

A Proposal has been made to establish a water utility in the Kaibab Estates West area. This utility will explore the possibility of running a water line from Ash Fork to the KEW area. Alternatively this project is exploring the possibility of drilling a well in the area. This project will also eliminate the need for hauled water for many of the KEW residents who live in the more densely populated area. The aim of the project is to bring down the cost of water for the residents of KEW.

It is also becoming apparent

that the needs of the residents of Kaibab Estates West need a place to come together and discuss issues that are common within the community. This utility district is also trying to serve that function as well.

The Kaibab Estates West Water Utility District establishment is moving along fast. A meeting will be held this Thursday the 29th of October at 7:00 PM to discuss the board members who will establish and run the district. We will also discuss regular monthly meetings.

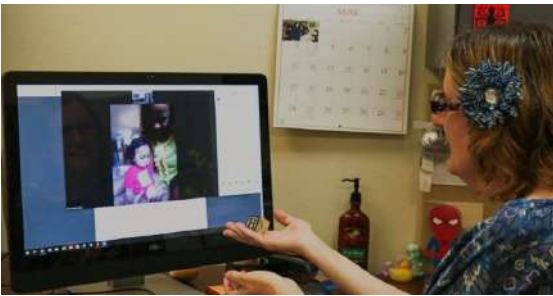

## Supporting families of young kids virtually

**Ash Fork** — Since the coronavirus pandemic began, technology has become nearly essential to stay in contact with friends and family. For many who work with young children, technology has also offered an alternative way to provide those families resources and support.

First Things First, Arizona’s early childhood agency, funds early learning and family support programs across the state. Many of those programs have adjusted the way they work with families to continue to provide services during this challenging time. For example, parenting classes have gone online, and providers are connecting more with families by phone or text. Libraries are hosting live story time through online video chat, while parents watch alongside their child and are able to ask their child questions and reactions to the story.

More examples are found statewide. In some parts of Arizona, developmental screenings, which are critical for identifying developmental delays in babies, toddlers and preschoolers are being conducted through online video chat.

FTF funds the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension free [virtual developmental screenings](#) in Pinal and Gila counties and the San Carlos Apache Tribe. Screeners use an online video chat program to walk the parent or caregiver through a questionnaire which is designed to look for developmental delays in children before they enter kindergarten.

“With a screening, we are able to provide timely information on the child’s development and offer support activities,” said Esther Turner, a senior program coordinator with Pinal County Cooperative Extension who does screenings. “With more children at home during this crisis, it is very important that we educate parents on their child’s development and realistic developmental expectations.”

The Birth to Five Helpline, a statewide helpline that is partially funded by FTF, earlier this year, started offering parents and caregivers the opportunity to meet face-to-face over online video chat to answer questions.

The helpline is a free service for all Arizona parents or caregivers to call, text or email with questions about their young child’s development. The helpline can also offer families connections to local resources and supports.

**The Birth to Five Helpline is available at 1-877-705-KIDS (5437)** from Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. You can also leave a voicemail, [submit your question online](#), or text the Helpline 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

FTF also funds home visitation, which provides a trained parent educator who makes in-home visits and offers personalized support families with children birth to age 5. Those visits are now conducted online. For example, in northern Arizona, parent educators working with the Hopi Tribe now leave a box of supplies and resources for the participating families at their door then drive back to their office to conduct a home visit virtually or by phone with the family.

Families have adjusted to this new model being parent, as well as teacher, but the Group Connections, which are a staple of the home visitation program and bring together multiple families, is where the team got creative, said Alyssa Fredericks, a parent educator.

“Our Group Connection for May was for families to make Jell-O Jigglers and share some photos about the process,” she said. “It turned out to be a very successful activity as parents shared their stories with pictures.”

Through all of the changes as families have to adapt in so many ways during the pandemic, providers say it is important to maintain a sense of normalcy for families. In the midst of all the fear and uncertainty experienced worldwide this year, the simple gift of a carefully packed shoebox can be a life-changing treasure that demonstrates God's love in a tangible way, letting children know they are not alone and not forgotten.

Some suggested items to pack would be "Wow" items (stuffed animals, dolls, clothing), personal care items (combs, toothbrushes, washcloths, soap), school supplies (pencils, pens, notebooks, scissors, erasers, sharpeners), and toys (balls, yo-yos, jump ropes, puzzles). And feel free to add a personal note, just to let that child know they're special and loved.

Some items that *cannot* be included would be: candy, gum, toothpaste, used or damaged items, war-related items, or anything liquid or breakable.

## Superintendents' Corner

Looks like we went straight from summer to winter. Fortunately everything here at the school is beginning to look a little bit more like it is supposed to. Classrooms are full, employees are busy, and great sports games are being played.

One of the best things happening here at the school is the announcement from The Arizona Education Foundation awarding our Ash Fork Middle School with the A + School of Excellence Award. The application process for this award was completed last year, but do to Covid-19 the awardees weren't recognized until this school year. The Arizona Education Foundation sent two judges for two days to observe classrooms and survey students, staff and community members in order to ensure that Ash Fork Middle school was worthy of this designation. We are very proud of our students, staff and parents that made this award possible.

Another positive note for the district and community is how well everyone is doing during all the issues with Covid-19. I want to thank all of you for being so patient with all the strategies we have in place to keep everyone safe. I know there is a large spectrum on how everyone feels about Covid and how it should be handled. Unfortunately the school is placed in the middle of it,

and I appreciate our community being so understanding and cooperative. We monitor the stats on positive cases daily and do our best to stay vigilant for our families.

Some not so good news concerning Transwestern Pipeline and the Arizona Department of Revenue has resurfaced and will have an impact on our schools. Some of you may recall an issue in 2014 when the Arizona of Revenue settled a court case that caused schools in six counties to pay back revenue collected since 2011 to Transwestern with interest. Unfortunately, Ash Fork Schools was involved and had a payment amount of nearly \$400,000.00. We all believed that this was a onetime issue and were surprised to hear that the same issue was happening again and the state was once again going to lose in court. District administration worked with lawmakers during the Arizona Legislative Session for two years with no success. Ash Fork School Board sent numerous letters to Governor Ducey and State Representatives about the situation with no response. Last week we were finally able to have a meeting with Yavapai County School Superintendent, Tim Carter, and members of the Governor's Office. The meeting is a step in the right direction, but little plans for improvement

were made. The current numbers that just Ash Fork School District will pay is 1.2 million dollars. Yes you heard that right 1.2 million. Fortunately, Ash Fork School Finance department and the School Board has prepared for this worst case scenario, but some future large school capital projects may be affected. We will keep all stakeholders posted as we learn more about this issue.

To end on some good news, the school building will get a 1.7 million dollar facelift all paid for with grant funds from the Arizona Schools Facility Board. The project includes all new paint, grading, windows, and roof resurfacing. The district will pay for new heating and AC units to be replaced during the project. Please be safe around all construction equipment and projects.
